# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

May 2023 marks the end of my term as TCSRA president; how quickly the year has gone! A brief recap of 2022-2023: As we emerged from the COVIDimposed shut down, we welcomed our members back in-person at September's birthday picnic. Beginning in October, we have met at Indian Summer, a new venue for us, for the remaining luncheons. Our programs covered a wide-range of topics. We learned from two Native American speakers, Jared Koepp and Hanford McCloud, and we met Tom Paine in the context of Art Dolan's presentation. We heard from Dr. Jennifer Bonds-Raacke, the new president of Saint Martin's University, and we enjoyed holiday music from the Timberline High School choir. We hosted some of our mini-grant recipients at the first "Parade of Projects" luncheon in three years. We continued to be active in supporting legislation. We also achieved goals related to membership and community service.

A significant undertaking this year was a review of the TCSRA bylaws. Many changes were made to reflect current policy and practice, to clarify intent, and to add topics that were missing. The vote to accept the amended bylaws will be held this month remotely via email or USPS.

The WSSRA Convention will be June 5-7, 2023, at the Pasco Red Lion. The keynote speaker will be Teacher of the Year for 2023, Dana Miles, Washington School for the Deaf teacher of Work Experience and English Language Arts. # LEGISLATIVE REPORT



By the time this newsletter reaches you, the 2023 Legislative Session will have adjourned. It's been a long session, literally and figuratively. This is

a 105-day budget writing session—next January's will be a 60-day supplemental. Seventeen hundred bills have been sponsored by Washington state legislators since January. Several thousand amendments have been written.

**PLAN 1 COLA:** The odds of a TRS/PERS Plan 1 COLA look good. The current proposal is for a 3% COLA capped at \$110 per month. This is not locked in, and WSSRA's advocacy team is still lobbying hard to make sure it's retained in the budget.

Retirees would prefer an automatic annual COLA or one that matched this year's 8% inflation rate. Legislators seem uninterested in addressing the issue in a wholistic way this session. WSSRA will continue that fight for this into the interim and next session.

**MEDICAL BENEFITS (ALL PENSION PLANS):** The Governor, the State Healthcare Authority, the House of Representatives, and the Senate are all on board with continuing the \$183 monthly Medicare Eligible Healthcare Benefit. This is good news. The benefit is noncontractual and must be reapproved every two years.

**PLAN 1 FUNDING:** For years retirees have advocated for the elimination of the TRS 1 and PERS 1 pension unfunded liability. Those funding gaps are one of the often-cited reasons for not restoring a permanent Plan 1 COLA. The current payment plan would have the

### In Memoriam

We note the passing of **James Horacek** and **Shirley Sainsbury**, and we offer sincere condolences to their family and friends.

TRS 1 and PERS 1 unfunded liabilities paid off by the year 2026. Payments would then cause the funded status to surge past over 150% in the 2030s—a scenario that would be fine for WSSRA but that, understandably, would cause heartburn for legislators with budgeting responsibilities.

Legislators prefer a different scenario. Appropriators are trying to finesse the payment structure to provide 100% funding this decade and then smooth contributions so funding stays at 100% in the future. WSSRA believes those pension contribution savings should be used to fund an automatic COLA for TRS 1 and PERS 1 retirees. Many legislators disagree. This matter is part of the final budget negotiations.

### TRS & SERS PLANS 2/3 ENHANCEMENTS

WSSRA has been working on passage of two bills to improve and equalize benefits within TRS 2/3 and

# "How to Attract Fun"

Do you know about TED talks? TED's mission is to explore ideas worth spreading, and ideas abound at this site under Tech, Business, Arts + Design, Science, and We Humans, and are expressed in short, powerful talks with a maximum length of 18 minutes on any topic.

At ideas.ted.com, Catherine Price gives a TED talk and writes an essay titled, "We all know people who seem to attract fun-here's how you can do it too." While interviewing people for her new book, The Power of Fun: How to Feel Alive Again, Catherine Price asked: Describe characteristics of "fun people" in your life. Some answers were:

- \*They're spontaneous.
- \*They're at ease with themselves and comfortable in their own skin.
- \*They're not afraid to be silly.
- \*They're not afraid to try new things and to be a beginner.
- \*They're not afraid to be vulnerable.
- \*They're appreciative of the small things.
- \*They find joy in being alive."

### How did fun people treat others?

- \*They never make you feel judged.
- \*They make everyone feel included.
- \*They're considerate of others' feelings.
- \*They get excited with you.
- \*They create wonderful, shared memories."

People who attract fun have a "fun mindset." They approach life by creating or appreciating playfulness; by making connections with others through special shared experiences, and by being in the zone or flow. They laugh easily, say "yes, and," add playfulness to everyday activities, and send out play signals.

In improv comedy, one uses the "yes, and" technique to respond to new ideas by agreeing with them and building on them. Catherine cites Tina Fey's example in "Bossy Pants." "If I start a scene with 'I can't believe it's so hot in here,' and you just say, 'Yeah ... ' we're kind of at a standstill. But if I say, 'I can't believe it's so hot in here,' and you say, 'What did you expect? We're in hell." Or if I say, 'I can't believe it's so hot in here,' and you say, 'Yes, this can't be good for the wax figurines,' now we're getting somewhere."

What play signals do is invite a safe, emotional connection, says Dr. Stuart Brown in "Play: How It Shapes the Brain, Opens the Imagination and Invigorates the Soul." It could be brief eye contact combined with a smile and a comment that invites conversation. It could be a sincere compliment, a remark about the weather, a joke, or a sympathetic observation. "It transforms a grim, fearful, and lonely world into a lively one."

In summary in her TED talk, Catherine Price says that when she asked people to tell her about the times that they had fun, they would tell her about some of the most joyful and treasured memories of their lives. She concludes that fun is energizing, keeps us in the present, unites us, makes us healthier, helps us feel like we are actually alive, and fills us with joy and happiness.

SERS 2/3. Both bills are technical and somewhat boring; but both will provide real benefits to retirees. House Bill 1008 has passed the legislature! This bill will allow all future retirees to defer their PEBB retiree insurance if they separate from service early without drawing a retirement.

House Bill 1056 is on the verge of passing. It equalizes return-to-work rules so all retirees, even administrators and general government employees, will be able to work a minimum of 867 hours in retirement without jeopardizing their pension payments.
